FORKWORD

At the ourbreak of the Civil war, John Johnston, a direct descendant of Scottish Covenanters, was in college preparing . himself for the Presbyterian ministry. Although a frail, delicate boy, he gave up his studies and joined the Confederate army, and was a member of Forrest's Cavalry for the entire duration of the war.

I have often heard my mother - his sister - speak of his mental and physical suffering during the war. Mental, on account of his deep religious convictions and his love of home and country. Physical, because he was sick a large part of the time.

Unable to continue his ministerial studies on account of disrupted conditions following the war, he entered the law office of his brother-in-law, Bedford M. Estes, of Memphis, and began the study of law; and was a prominent attorney in Memphis throughout a long life.

Although an attorney, his whole life was one of Christian ministry; and he was an outstanding member and elder of the Southern Presbyterian Church until his death on May 7, 1928.
