The next meeting of the Nashville (TN) Civil War Roundtable will be on Tuesday, JAugust 16th, 2022, in the visitor's center of Ft. Negley Park, a unit of Metro Parks, Nashville, TN. This is located off I-65 just south of downtown between 4th Avenue South and 8th Avenue South on Edgehill Avenue/Chestnut Avenue. Take Exit 81, Wedgewood Avenue, off I-65 and follow the signs to the Science Museum.

The meeting begins at 7:00 PM and is always open to the public. Members please bring a friend or two – new recruits are always welcomed.

Our Speaker and Topic - "The Battle Of Stones River: A Reappraisal"

The December 1862/early January 1863 Battle of Stones River, fought about 35 miles southeast of Nashville, was a crucial engagement of the Civil War. The Union victory helped offset the debacle of Fredericksburg in Virginia fought a couple weeks earlier. The political aspect of the victory helped add much needed credibility to the Emancipation Proclamation which took effect on January 1, 1863 during the final day of Stones River.

Several books on the battle have been written along with biographies of Union commander William S. Rosecrans and Confederate commander Braxton Bragg that have added greatly to our knowledge of the events in this battle and time frame. And yet new material and interpretations arise and this program is no exception.

Our speaker this month, in a return engagement offers this concept: "Everybody knows what happened during the Battle of Stones River. The facts are not in dispute. Of that there is no question. After decades of reflecting on those facts, I have concluded that the narrative commonly associated with those facts is profoundly flawed. I believe you will never think about the Battle of Stones River the same way again."

Our speaker this month is Rhea Cole of Murfreesboro, Tennessee. He has been a living history volunteer at Stones River NB since 1994. During that time, Rhea has participated in cannon firing programs at every black powder venue from Wilson's Creek, MO to Bristol, England. As a result, he has discussed just about every aspect of Civil War history with a wide spectrum of amateur & professional historians. On his own, he has invested decades into studying the Signal Corps, Sanitary Commission & logistics.

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We hope you will join us for what promises to be a fresh look at a major Tennessee battle.

Last Month's meeting

We had one of the best programs in the history of the Nashville CWRT when John Banks came and presented "The People of the Battle of Antietam." One of the most pivotal battles of the Civil War, the Union strategic victory being enough for Abraham Lincoln to issue the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation, it remains to today America's bloodiest day. The key focus of the program was the focus on officers and men of both sides and their roles in the battle; where they fought, where they were wounded and where they died. A wonderful Power Point with excellent images supported the program and John told the stories of these people. The American Battlefield Trust Continues to Buy and Preserve Hallowed Ground

The American Battlefield Trust carries on its campaign of saving battlefield land from modern development. A recent tract has come available on the slopes of Lookout Mountain where an old motel, long closed, remains along a tract of original roadbed around the nose of the mountain. Also – they have an online petition that you can sign to help protect the Wyse Fork Battlefield in North Carolina which was fought in 1865 as part of Sherman's Campaign. This petition is designed to resist the expansion of the roadway which would eat up more battlefield land including where Union troops fought.
