August 15th, 2023 - Our 150th meeting!! We continue our fourteenth year!

The next meeting of the Nashville (TN) Civil War Roundtable will be on Tuesday, August 15th, 2023, in the visitor's center of Ft. Negley Park, a unit of Metro Parks, Nashville, TN. This is located at 1100 Fort Negley Blvd. off I-65 just south of downtown between 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue South and 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue South on Edgehill Avenue/Chestnut Avenue. Take Exit 81, Wedgewood Avenue, off I-65 and follow the signs to the Science Museum.

The meeting begins at 7:00 PM and is always open to the public. Members please bring a friend or two – new recruits are always welcomed.

July is our fiscal year so please plan on paying your membership dues at this meeting if you missed that. Without dues we cannot get speakers and programs so please support the Nashville CWRT.

Our Speaker and Topic - "William S. Rosecrans and His Campaign For Chattanooga"

We meet this month, and year, on a historically auspicious day. One hundred and sixty years ago, Army of the Cumberland commander Major General William Starke Rosecrans was kicking off the next phase of his Campaign for Chattanooga, the phase, which, as it would turn out, would finally bring the Ohioan, and the Union cause, the Gateway to the Deep South city, Chattanooga, to then be able to thrust a saber into the very innards of the Confederacy, the Empire State of the South, Georgia.

Much was in the offing; much hung in the balance. Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park Historian Jim Ogden will discuss Rosecrans' mid-August plan of campaign in his talk for us this evening, a subject of much discussion on those same mid-August days in 1863, and a subject, which, as it unfolded would take his army into, and beyond, the mountains looming over Chattanooga. It is an aspect of "Chickamauga" and "Chattanooga" that gets less attention than the bloody, bitter, fighting in the Valley of the River of Death a month later or the spectacular Union victories on the slopes of Lookout Mountain and Missionary Ridge two months after that. But, it is, arguably, an aspect which, in the end, is equally as important for Union success as Thomas' stand on Snodgrass Hill or the Army of the Cumberland's famous charge up Missionary Ridge.

James (Jim) Ogden, III is a native of St. Mary's County, Maryland. Interested in the Civil War since childhood, he obtained a degree in American History through the Civil War period and American Military History from Frostburg State College. During college, he worked summers for the Maryland Park Service at Point Lookout State Park, site of the largest Civil War prison, where historical interpretation and research were among the many positions he held. As part

of a college internship, he worked for four months at Harpers Ferry National Historical Park, West Virginia, researching and writing on an aspect of that site's Civil War history that had not been addressed previously.

Beginning work with the National Park Service in 1982, he has been stationed at Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park, Georgia and Tennessee, Russell Cave National Monument, Alabama, and Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park, Virginia. In November, 1988, he returned to Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park as the Staff Historian, the position he presently holds.

He speaks regularly on aspects of the Civil War to historical organizations across the eastern half of the U. S. including Civil War Round Tables in New York, Chicago, Minneapolis, Atlanta, Birmingham, New Orleans, and Austin. In addition to doing tours of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga battlefields, he periodically takes groups to Shiloh, Perryville, Stones River, some of the Atlanta Campaign sites (including Dalton, Resaca, Cassville, New Hope, Pickett's Mill, and Kennesaw Mountain), and Franklin and Nashville.

He has taught a number of Civil War history courses for the Continuing Education Department of the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and in the Spring Semester of 2012 he taught UTC's for-credit Civil War and Reconstruction course. He has published a number of short articles in several local publications and has appeared on Greystone Communications/Arts and Entertainment Network's "Civil War Journal," the History Channel's "Civil War Combat," PBS's "History Detectives," and C-SPAN.

Since 1986, he has been an instructor for over six hundred groups of officers of the U. S. Army conducting Staff Rides (an in-depth analysis of a historical military event) at Chickamauga and Chattanooga. For a decade, his Staff Ride clients even included two to six hundred officers annually from the British Army's Joint Services Command and Staff College.

The recognitions of his contributions to Civil War History and Preservation include the Friends of Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park Drew Haskins, Jr., Memorial Service Award (1998), Civil War Trust Chairman's Award for Excellence in Preservation (2011), Chattanooga Area Historical Association Dr. James W. Livingood Historian of the Year Award (2014), University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Department of Communication 22<sup>nd</sup> Annual Symposium on the 19<sup>th</sup> Century Press, The Civil War, and Free Expression Dr. Hazel Dicken-Garcia Distinguished Scholarship in Journalism History Award (2014), the Civil War Round Table of Chicago Allan Nevins-Douglas Southall Freeman Award (2014), United States Army Commander's Award for Public Service (2017), Civil War Trust's National Park Service Preservation Advocate Award (2017), and the Department of the Army's Superior Public Service Medal (2019).

For those of you who have never heard Jim Ogden before please make sure you come to this meeting! He is always a wonderful speaker and his programs are of excellent research and presentation.

# July 2023 meeting

Walter Green of Franklin, TN gave us a fine program on the Nashville & Decatur Railroad during the Civil War. This crucial line for both sides ran from Nashville to Decatur, Alabama where it connected to the vital Memphis & Charleston Railroad. Mr. Green detailed the original formation and building of the line and then moved into its use in the war. The line was used more by the Union since Nashville sell so early in the war and it fell upon them to keep it maintained and protected since it was now a target for guerrillas and main force Confederate cavalry raids. Bridges were built and rebuilt (some washing out due to rain storms) and blockhouses and forts were erected to allow for its defense. With his engineering background, Mr. Green discussed how some of the bridge designs were not up to par especially in their supports, which caused a number of problems.

This was a really enjoyable and informative program and we thank him for sharing it with us. Those that missed the meeting can get his book on Amazon or through local book stores.
